# Wise Birding Holidays Bird and mammal watching tours

### **CANADA: Point Pelee & Long Point Migration**

Friday 5th May - Saturday 13th May 2023

#### HIGHLIGHTS OF TRIP

**American Woodcock:** Everyone voted for 'bird of the trip' and American Woodcock came top for 3 of the 4 clients, narrowly pipping Hooded Warbler to the top spot. The tension built as we waited (and hoped) for this bird to appear and start displaying at dusk at Point Pelee, and when it did, it was an unforgettable experience. Quality! Reverse migration at the Tip, Point Pelee: On the evening of the 6th we decided we would get up early and make our way to the Tip. A possible reverse migration event was on the cards, given the favourable wind direction and also the fact that spring migration had been slow up to the this point. We were not to be disappointed! Hundreds (no doubt thousands) of birds in the trees at the Tip and heading south out across the lake, the excitement was palpable amongst the hundreds of birders there. Some were identifying birds in the sky by taking photos and then looking at the photos afterwards, other birds were easy to identify as they were in the bushes and low scrub at point blank range. Rarest was the male Western Tanager which appeared on two occasions, but the sheer spectacle & shared experience will never be forgotten. Fall at Long Point: Numbers of birds at the migration hotspots is clearly dictated by weather conditions and time of the year. Every day at Long Point had been enjoyable with lots of birds to see, but it was clear during the early morning on 12th that there were significantly more birds around and it proved to be a brilliant day. We spent the best part of 10 hours between Old Cut and the old Provincial Park nearby, scooping up migrants left, right and centre. We recorded 19 species of warbler, 4 of which were new for the trip (Bay-breasted, Hooded, Wilson's and Blackpoll).





#### **Tour Summary**

This was Wise Birding's first tour to Canada and it was such a successful tour it is already in the schedule for 2024. Relatively easy birding at just two main bases, flat walking, excellent accommodation, great food, and a pleasant climate make for a superb overseas trip and we haven't even mentioned the American wood warblers!

Our first base was the famous Point Pelee, and our accommodation in Leamington proved to be well placed, just 20 minutes or so from the park entrance and plenty of eateries nearby. We stayed in a characterful and spacious house on Lakeshore Road which was just perfect. Point Pelee National Park was bigger than the group had expected, with a long road with lots of interesting habitat along the way, lots of car parks and facilities, terminating at the excellent Visitor Centre. From here we could either hop on the regular shuttle to the Tip or walk there, birding all the way.

Every day at Pelee was different and we easily racked up over 100 species within the park during our 3 and a bit days there, earning us each the coveted pin badge. It was just very enjoyable taking our time to search different areas and find our own birds, with the occasional twitch to see something new. Highlights included a rare Western Tanager, a day roosting Eastern Whip-poor-will, a multitude of colourful warblers, and not forgetting that incredible American Woodock display.

We paid 2 visits to the nearby Hillman Marsh and the fields in between for a bit of variety, which was really enjoyable and added several new birds for the trip including Horned Lark, Buff-bellied Pipit, both Yellowlegs, Hooded Merganser and Bufflehead. To break up the 3.5 hour drive to Long Point, our second base, we spent a cracking few hours at Rondeau, another migrant hotspot on the north shore of Lake Erie. Here we added White-breasted Nuthatch and a day-roosting Eastern Screech Owl, and some brilliant views of the birds visiting the feeders at the Visitor Centre.

Our base for the Long Point area was Port Dover, around 30 minutes from the Old Cut Field Station, the publicly accessible part of Long Point Bird Observatory. Again our accommodation was excellent and we were within walking distance of several excellent places to eat. The birding at Long Point was brilliant, and we could cover several sites at a leisurely pace without having to drive more than a kilometre or two.

It was great to be able to see the work of the Bird Observatory in full swing, and we were treated to some incredible views of birds in the hand whilst they were quickly processed, but we most enjoyed pottering about searching for migrants in the woods and scrub: there was a lot of looking at the floor and looking high up on the trees, so we all ended up with a bit of 'warbler neck'!

Everyone really enjoyed this trip, the length of the trip was perfect for a two-base tour and the birding was relaxed, enjoyable and exciting.

We recorded 168 species of bird, 7 mammals and 3 reptiles on this tour.

3	Sun 7 May	<b>Point Pelee:</b> A second full day in the park, with an early start to catch the first shuttle to the Tip. Right decision: superb reverse migration event with hundreds of birds overhead and in the trees, including a rare West Tanager. Finished at dusk with the highlight of the trip, a displaying American Woodcock. <b>Overnight Leamington</b>
4	Mon 8 May	Point Pelee: Roosting Eastern Whip-poor-will, Wild Turkey, Ruby-throated Hummingbird and Red-headed Woodpecker.  Hillman Marsh: both yellowlegs, Least Sandpiper, Hooded Merganser and Bufflehead. Nearby Horned Lark and Buff-bellied Pipit.  Overnight Leamington
5	Tues 9 May	Hillman Marsh: More waders & wildfowl, including Trumpeter Swan. Rondeau: Baltimore Oriole, White-breasted Nuthatch, and our only Eastern Screech Owl of the trip. Overnight Port Dover
6	Wed 10 May	<b>Long Point:</b> Black-throated Green Warbler, Magnolia Warbler, Scarlet Tanager, Forster's Tern. <b>Overnight Port Dover</b>
7	Thur 11 May	<b>Long Point:</b> Golden-winged Warbler, Wood Thrush, Veery, Lincoln's Sparrow. <b>Overnight Port Dover</b>
8	Fri 12 May	<b>Long Point:</b> Significant fall with Blackpoll Warbler, Wilson's Warbler, Philadelphia Vireo & Hooded Warbler all new. <b>Overnight Port Dover</b>
9	Sat 13 May	Long Point: last morning but still added Bay-breasted Warbler, Bobolink, and Savannah Sparrow Afternoon: transfer to Toronto Airport

The **bird checklist** follows the nomenclature and classification from Gill F, D Donsker & P Rasmussen (Eds). 2022. **IOC World Bird List** (v13.2).

The IOC World Bird List complements three other primary world bird lists that differ slightly in their primary goals & taxonomic philosophy i.e. The Clements Checklist of the Birds of the World, The Howard & Moore Complete Checklist of the Birds of the World, 4th Ed, & HBW Alive/Bird Life International.

Canada Goose Branta canadensis

Regularly seen in the wetland areas of Point Pelee and Long Point.

Mute Swan Cygnus olor

1-2 at both Point Pelee and Long Point.

Trumpeter Swan Cygnus buccinator

2 at Hillman Marsh, near Point Pelee, on both 8th and 9th.

Wood Duck Aix sponsa

A total of 9 at Point Pelee, Hillman Marsh and Backus Woods near Long Point.

Blue-winged Teal Spatula discors

Singles at Point Pelee on 7th and 8th, and 30+ at Hillman Marsh on 8th and 9th.

Northern Shoveler Spatula clypeata

Drake at Hillman Marsh 9th.

Gadwall Mareca strepera

20 Hillman Marsh 8th.

American Wigeon *Mareca americana* 

12 Hillman Marsh 8th-9th, and a single Long Point causeway 10th.

Mallard Anas platyrhynchos

Recorded at Point Pelee, Hillman Marsh, and Big Creek NWA (Long Point).

Green-winged Teal Anas carolinensis

3 at Hillman Marsh 8th.

Redhead Aythya americana

A drake distantly from Port Rowan (Lion's Park) on 12th.

Greater Scaup Aythya marila

A drake at Point Pelee 8th.

Lesser Scaup Aythya affinis

Recorded at Point Pelee, Hillman Marsh, and Long Point (Inner Bay viewing stand).

Greater / Lesser Scaup Avthya marila / affinis

Distant, unidentifiable Scaup, seen from the Tip at Long Point on a couple of occasions.

Surf Scoter Melanitta perspicillata

All records passing the Tip at Point Pelee: 10 on 5th, 20 on 6th, 4 on 7th.

Bufflehead Bucephala albeola

Female at Hillman Marsh on 8th.

Common Goldeneye Bucephala clangula

Drake at Hillman Marsh on 9th.

Hooded Merganser Lophodytes cucullatus

Female at Hillman Marsh on 8th.

Red-breasted Merganser Mergus serrator

Large numbers seen from the Tip at Point Pelee on 6th and 7th.

Ruddy Duck Oxyura jamaicensis

Singles at Hillman Marsh on 8<sup>th</sup> and 9<sup>th</sup>, 6 at Long Point (inner bay) on 11<sup>th</sup> and a larger flock on 12<sup>th</sup>.

Wild Turkey Meleagris gallopavo

Up to 6 seen daily at Point Pelee 6th-9th.

Eastern Whip-poor-will Antrostomus vociferous

2 calling at Point Pelee at dusk on 7<sup>th</sup>, and 1 seen roosting by day there on 8<sup>th</sup>.

Chimney Swift Chaetura pelagica

2 at Point Pelee on 7th, with 4 there on 8th.

Ruby-throated Hummingbird Archilochus colubris

2 at Point Pelee on 8th, 5 at Rondeau on 9th, singles at Long Point on 10th and 11th.

Yellow-billed Cuckoo Coccyzus americanus

1 briefly at Point Pelee on 8th.

Rock Dove (Feral Pigeon) Columba livia

Recorded on 3 dates in urban areas.

Mourning Dove Zenaida macroura

Seen regularly throughout the tour.

Virgina Rail Rallus limicola

1 heard at Point Pelee on 7th.

Sora Porzana carolina

1 showed really well from the Marsh Boardwalk on 8th.

American Coot Fulica americana

20 at Hillman Marsh 8th and 9th, 2 at Long Point (Big Creek NWA) on 11th.

Sandhill Crane Antigone canadensis

2 at Point Pelee on 8th, 3 at Hillman Marsh on 9th, 8 at Long Point on 10th, 3 west of Port Dover on 13th.

Slavonian Grebe *Podiceps auritus* 

2 off the Tip at Point Pelee on 8th, 4 at Hillman Marsh on 8th.

Grey Plover Pluvialis squatarola

30 in fields north of Point Pelee on 8th, 67 at Wheatley on 9th.

Semipalmated Plover Charadrius semipalmatus

2 in fields north of Point Pelee on 8th, 6 at Hillman Marsh on 9th.

Killdeer Charadrius vociferus

Encountered throughout the tour, including on several occasions pairs with small chicks.

Dunlin Calidris alpina

200 at Hillman Marsh on 8th, with around 300 there on 9th.

Least Sandpiper Calidris minutilla

6 at Hillman Marsh on 8th and 9th.

Short-billed / Long-billed Dowitcher Limnodromus griseus / scolopaceus

7 in fields north of Point Pelee on 8th, were probably Short-billed but too distant to be 100% sure.

American Woodcock Scolopax minor

A male displaying at dusk at Point Pelee on 7th.

Spotted Sandpiper Actitis macularius

1 at the Tip at Point Pelee on 7th and 8th.

Greater Yellowlegs Tringa melanoleuca

5 at Hillman Marsh on 8th and 9th, and a single at Long Point on 10th.

Lesser Yellowlegs Tringa flavipes

9 at Hillman Marsh on 8th, with 18 there on 9th.

Bonaparte's Gull Chroicocephalus philadelphia

Up to 40 seen daily at the Tip at Point Pelee, 30 at Hillman Marsh on 9<sup>th</sup> and several at Wheatley Harbour on 9<sup>th</sup>.

Ring-billed Gull Larus delawerensis

Small numbers daily at the Tip at Point Pelee, also recorded at Hillman Marsh and Long Point.

Great Black-backed Gull Larus marinus

A single second-calendar year bird at the Tip at Point Pelee on 8th.

American Herring Gull Larus smithsonianus

Seen daily in small numbers at the Tip at Point Pelee, also recorded at Hillman Marsh, Wheatley and Long Point.

Caspian Tern Hydroprogne caspia

Seen only from the Long Point causeway with 22 on 10th, 1 on 11th and 2 on 13th.

Common Tern Sterna hirundo

20 at the Tip at Point Pelee on 8th, 40 at Hillman Marsh on 9th.

Forster's Tern Sterna forsteri

All records in the Long Point area with 3 at the new Provincial Park and 1 from the causeway on 10<sup>th</sup>, and 3 over Old Cut on 13<sup>th</sup>.

Black Tern Chlidonias niger

North American race *surinamensis* seen: 3 at Point Pelee on 8<sup>th</sup>, 30 at Hillman Marsh on 9<sup>th</sup>, and 1 at Long Point (Big Creek NWA) on 11<sup>th</sup>.

Common Loon (Great Northern Diver) Gavia immer

3 at Point Pelee on 8th

Double-crested Cormorant Nannopterum auritum

Seen daily at Point Pelee with often large numbers at the Tip, also recorded at Hillman Marsh.

Great Blue Heron Ardea herodias

Several recorded at Point Pelee an Hillman Marsh on 8th-9th.

Great Egret Ardea alba

2-3 seen at Point Pelee and Hillman Marsh 8th-9th.

Green Heron Butorides virescens

1-2 recorded at Rondeau and Long Point 9th, 10th and 12th.

Turkey Vulture Cathartes aura

Recorded regularly in most locations and habitats.

Osprey Pandion haliatus

1-2 seen on 4 dates at Point Pelee and Long Point.

Northern Harrier Circus hudsonius

1 from the causeway at Long Point on 10<sup>th</sup>.

Sharp-shinned Hawk Accipter striatus

1 at Point Pelee on 6th.

Cooper's Hawk Accipter cooperii

1 at Backus Woods on 11th.

Bald Eagle Haliaeetus leucocephalus

Between 1 and 4 seen on 6 dates at Point Pelee, Hillman Marsh and Long Point.

Broad-winged Hawk Buteo platypterus

1 at Point Pelee on 7th and a small movement of at least 20 there on 8th.

Red-tailed Hawk Buteo jamaicensis

1 from the car west of Toronto on 5<sup>th</sup>, and 2 from the car on the return to Toronto on 13<sup>th</sup>.

Eastern Screech-Owl Megascops asio

1 roosting at Rondeau on 9th.

Belted Kingfisher Megaceryle alcyon

1 at Leamington on 5th and another at Point Pelee on 7th.

Yellow-bellied Sapsucker Sphyrapicus varius

1 at Point Pelee on 5th, 3 Backus Woods on 10th and 2 there on 11th.

Red-headed Woodpecker *Melanerpes erythrocephalus* 

Singles (probably the same mobile bird) at Point Pelee 5th-8th.

Red-bellied Woodpecker *Melanerpes carolinus* 

1-2 Point Pelee on 6<sup>th</sup>-7<sup>th</sup>, 4 at Backus Woods on 10<sup>th</sup>, 1 there on 11<sup>th</sup>, and 2 at Long Point (Old Provincial Park) on 12<sup>th</sup>.

Downy Woodpecker Dryobates pubescens

Seen roadside west of Toronto, Point Pelee, Rondeau and Long Point, max. 6 Point Pelee on 6<sup>th</sup>.

Hairy Woodpecker Leuconotopicus villosus

Singles seen at Point Pelee, Rondeau, Long Point (new Provincial Park) and Backus Woods.

Pileated Woodpecker Dryocopus pileatus

2 birds heard, but not seen, at Backus Woods on 10th and 11th.

Northern Flicker Colaptes auratus

Up to 3 seen at Point Pelee on 5th-8th, and 2 at Long Point on 10th.

American Kestrel Falco sparverius

2 seen from the car west of Toronto on 5th.

Merlin Falco columbianus

Singles at Point Pelee on 6th and 8th (presumably of race *richardsonii*).

Eastern Wood-Pewee

1 at Long Point on 11th, with 3 there on 12th.

Least Flycatcher Empidonax minimus

The most commonly encountered flycatcher, up to 3 seen at Point Pelee, and 4 at Long Point on a total of 6 dates.

Contopus virens

Eastern Phoebe Sayornis phoebe

1 at Backus Woods on 10th.

Great Crested Flycatcher Myiarchus crinitus

Singles seen on 5 dates ay both Point Pelee and Long Point.

Eastern Kingbird Tyrannus tyrannus

Up to 2 seen on 5 dates at both Point Pelee and Long Point.

White-eyed Vireo Vireo griseus

1 briefly at Point Pelee on 5th.

Blue-headed Vireo Vireo solitarius

Seen on a total of 8 dates, max. 5 at Long Point on 11th.

Philadelphia Vireo Vireo philadelphicus

2 at Long Point on 12th, with 1 there on 13th.

Warbling Vireo Vireo gilvus

Seen on a total of 8 dates, max. 3 on 7th and 8th at Point Pelee.

Red-eyed Vireo Vireo olivaceus

3 at Long Point on 12th.

Blue Jay Cyanocitta cristata

Seen regularly at widespread locations including occasionally in flocks of 20+.

American Crow Corvus brachyrhynchos

Seen on several dates at Point Pelee, Long Point and from the car, but never numerous.

Cedar Waxwing Bombycilla cedrorum

4 flew over Point Pelee on 7th.

Black-capped Chickadee Poecile atricapillus

Seen on 7 dates at Point Pelee, Rondeau and Long Point.

Horned Lark Eremophila alpestris

2 seen in fields N of Point Pelee on 8th, with 5 there on 9th, and 2 at Hillman Marsh on 9th.

Northern Rough-winged Swallow Stelgidopteryx serripennis

A few seen at Point Pelee on 5th-7th, and 3 at Wheatley on 9th.

Purple Martin Progne subis

Seen only at Rondeau and at Long Point, where they were visiting nest boxes.

Tree Swallow Tachycineta bicolor

Seen daily at Point Pelee, Hillman Marsh and Long Point.

Sand Martin Riparia riparia

Recorded at Point Pelee and Hillman Marsh on 7th and 8th.

**Barn Swallow** Hirundo rustica

Seen in good numbers on at least 5 dates at Point Pelee, Hillman Marsh, Wheatley, Rondeau and Long Point.

**American Cliff Swallow** Petrochelidon pyrrhonota

3 seen over fields north of Point Pelee on 9th.

**Ruby-crowned Kinglet** Corthylio calendula

Seen in good numbers at Point Pelee, Hillman Marsh and Long Point on 7 dates.

**Golden-crowned Kinglet** Regulus satrapa

3 at Point Pelee on 5th and 1 on 7th.

**Red-breasted Nuthatch** Sitta canadensis

Easily seen, maximum day count 10 on 7th, recorded on 6 dates at Point Pelee, Rondeau

and Long Point.

**White-breasted Nuthatch** Sitta carolinensis

2 at Rondeau on 9th.

Certhia americana **Brown Creeper** 

1 at Long Point on 10th.

**Blue-grey Gnatcatcher** Polioptila caerulea

Seen in small numbers on 5 dates at Point Pelee and Long Point.

**House Wren** Troglodytes aedon

A total of 11 seen on 5 dates at Point Pelee, Rondeau and Long Point

Winter Wren Troglodytes hiemalis

Singles at Long Point on 10th and 12th.

Cistothorus stellaris Sedge Wren

1 near the Tip at Point Pelee on 6th and 7th.

Marsh Wren Cistothorus palustris

1 near the Tip, in the company of the Sedge Wren, on 6th.

Carolina Wren Thryothorus Iudovicianus

A total of 10 seen on 5 dates, max. 4 at Point Pelee on 7th.

**Common Starling** Sturnus vulgaris

Recorded on 3 dates west of Toronto, Point Pelee and at Rondeau.

Dumetella carolinensis **Grey Catbird** 

1 to 5 birds seen on 8 dates, except for an obvious fall at Long Point on 11th with 5 at Old Cut and 15 at the Old Provincial Park.

**Brown Thrasher** Toxostoma rufum

A single at Point Pelee on 6th.

**Northern Mockingbird** Mimus polyglottos

Singles at Point Pelee on 8th and from the car heading towards Toronto on 13th.

**Eastern Bluebird** Sialia sialis

3 north-west of Long Point on 11th.

Catharus fuscescens Veerv

1-2 birds seen on 7 dates at Point Pelee, Rondeau and Long Point.

Swainson's Thrush Catharus ustulatus

1-2 birds seen on 6 dates at Point Pelee and Long Point.

**Hermit Thrush** 

Catharus guttatus

Singles seen on 5 dates at Point Pelee and Long Point.

**Wood Thrush** 

Hylocichla mustelina

1-2 birds seen on 3 dates at Point Pelee and Long Point.

**American Robin** 

Turdus migratorius

Widespread and numerous in gardens and at all sites visited.

**House Sparrow** 

Passer domesticus

Recorded at a roadside stop west of Toronto on 5th, and at Rondeau on 9th.

**Buff-bellied Pipit** 

Anthus rubescens

2 in fields north of Point Pelee on 8th.

**House Finch** 

Haemorhous mexicanus

Singles at Old Cut and the New Provincial Park, Long Point, on 10th.

**American Goldfinch** 

Spinus tristis

1-3 seen on 4 dates at Point Pelee, Hillman Marsh, Rondeau and Long Point.

**Chipping Sparrow** 

Spizella passerina

Seen commonly on 8 dates at all sites.

**Clay-coloured Sparrow** 

Spizella pallida

1 at Point Pelee on 6th.

**Field Sparrow** 

Spizella pusilla

A single at Point Pelee 5th-8th May.

**Dark-eyed Junco** 

Junco hyemalis

Singles at Point Pelee on 5th and 8th.

**White-crowned Sparrow** 

Zonotrichia leucophrys

Small numbers seen on 7 dates at Point Pelee, Rondeau and Long Point.

**White-throated Sparrow** 

Zonotrichia albicollis

Good numbers seen on 7 dates at Leamington, Point Pelee, Hillman Marsh, Rondeau and Long Point.

Savannah Sparrow

Passerculus sandwichensis

3 singing males in a field north west of Long Point on 13th.

**Song Sparrow** 

Melospiza melodia

1-3 seen on 4 dates at Point Pelee, Hillman Marsh, Rondeau and Long Point.

Lincoln's Sparrow

Melospiza lincolnii

1-3 seen at Long Point 10th-12th.

**Swamp Sparrow** 

Melospiza georgiana

1-2 seen on 4 dates at Point Pelee, Rondeau and Long Point.

**Eastern Towhee** 

Pipilo erythrophthalmus

1-2 seen on 4 dates at Point Pelee and Long Point.

**Bobolink** 

Dolichonyx oryzivorus

6 singing males in a field north west of Long Point on 13th.

**Orchard Oriole** 

Icterus spurius

Singles at Point Pelee on 7<sup>th</sup> and 8<sup>th</sup>, 1 at Rondeau on 9<sup>th</sup>, and 5 at Long Point (new Provincial Park) on 10<sup>th</sup>.

**Baltimore Oriole** 

Icterus galbula

Up to 9 seen on all 9 days of the trip, at Point Pelee, Wheatley, Rondeau and Long Point.

**Red-winged Blackbird** 

Agelaius phoeniceus

Common and widespread.

**Brown-headed Cowbird** 

Molothrus ater

Small number seen on 3 dates at several sites.

**Rusty Blackbird** 

Euphagus carolinus

4 at Point Pelee on 7th, 1 at Rondeau on 9th.

**Common Grackle** 

Quiscalus quiscula

Common and widespread.

**Ovenbird** 

Seirus aurocapilla

Singles seen on five dates at Point Pelee, Rondeau & Long Point. Three birds at Long Point on 12<sup>th</sup>.

**Northern Waterthrush** 

Parkesia novoboracensis

1 at Point Pelee on 6th, with 3 there on 7th, 3 at Rondeau on 9th & 2 at Long Point on 10th.

**Golden-winged Warbler** 

Vermivora chrysoptera

A stunning male trapped at Long Point on 11th.

**Blue-winged Warbler** 

Vermivora cyanoptera

2 at Point Pelee on 6th, and singles at Long Point on 11th, 12th and 13th.

**Black-and-white Warbler** 

Mniotilta varia

Regularly encountered with up to 4 seen on 6 dates at Point Pelee and Long Point.

**Prothonotary Warbler** 

Protonoaria citrea

A single male seen on territory at Long Point on 6th and 8th.

**Nashville Warbler** 

Leiothlypis ruficapilla

1-4 seen on 8 dates at Point Pelee, Rondeau and Long Point.

**Common Yellowthroat** 

Geothylypis trichas

Singles seen on 8 dates at Point Pelee and Long Point, with 2 on 12th at Long Point.

**Hooded Warbler** 

Setophaga citrina

A male showing ridiculously well at Long Point on the afternoon of 10th.

**American Redstart** 

Setophaga ruticilla

Recorded on 6 dates at Point Pelee and Long Point, usually 1-3 birds but with 8 at Long Point on 11<sup>th</sup> and 10 there on 12<sup>th</sup>.

**Cape May Warbler** 

Setophaga tigrina

1-6 birds seen on 6 dates, more numerous later in the trip at Long Point.

**Cerulean Warbler** 

Setophaga cerulea

1 seen briefly at Point Pelee on 7th.

**Northern Parula** 

Setophaga americana

2 at Point Pelee on 7th and the remaining records from Long Point 10th-13th, peak 5 on 12th.

Magnolia Warbler Setophaga magnolia

Singles at Point Pelee on 6th & 8th, the remainder from Long Point with peak of 10 on 12th.

**Bay-breasted Warbler** 

Setophaga castanea

5 at Long Point on 12th, 2 there on 13th.

#### **Blackburnian Warbler**

#### Setophaga fusca

A single at Point Pelee on 6th, then daily at Long Point 10th-13th with a peak of 6 on 13th.

#### **American Yellow Warbler**

Setophaga aestiva

The most numerous warbler, seen daily in good numbers.

#### **Chestnut-sided Warbler**

Setophaga pensylvanica

A single at Point Pelee on 7th, then seen daily at Long Point with a peak of 20 on 12th.

#### **Blackpoll Warbler**

Setophaga striata

A male at Long Point (old Provincial Park) on 12th.

**Black-throated Blue Warbler** 

Setophaga caerulescens

Seen on 6 dates, peak of 30 at Long Point on 12th.

**Palm Warbler** 

Setophaga palmarum

A total of 11 seen on 8 dates, 1 or 2 per day.

Pine Warbler

Setophaga pinus

A single at Hillman Marsh on 8th.

**Myrtle Warbler** 

Setophaga coronata

Seen on 7 dates, more numerous at Long Point in the 2<sup>nd</sup> half of the trip, into double figures on some days.

**Black-throated Green Warbler** 

Setophaga virens

1 at Point Pelee on 8th, then a total of 14 at Long Point 10th-13th, max. 5 on 12th.

Wilson's Warbler

Cardellina pusilla

A male at Long Point (just outside the old Provincial Park) on 12th.

**Scarlet Tanager** 

Piranga olivacea

3 at Point Pelee on 7th, then daily at Long Point, max. 6 on 12th.

**Western Tanager** 

Piranga ludoviciana

A male at Point Pelee on 7th, twice went south from the Tip during reverse migration event.

**Northern Cardinal** 

Cardinalis cardinalis

Recorded on 5 dates from Point Pelee, Hillman Marsh, Rondeau and Long Point.

**Rose-breasted Grosbeak** 

Pheucticus Iudovicianus

A total of 47 recorded on 7 dates, max. 20 at Long Point on 12th.

**Indigo Bunting** 

Passerina cyanea

Singles at Point Pelee on 7th, and Long Point on 10th and 12th (2 locations).



#### **Mammals**

Total number of mammals recorded: 7 species

Northern Racoon Procyon lotor

1 seen well at Rondeau.

White-tailed Deer Odocoileus virginianus

4 seen from car between Wheatley and Rondeau.

Eastern Cotton-tail Sylvilagus floridanus

Seen at most locations visited.

Eastern Grey Squirrel Sciurus carolinensis

Widespread and numerous.

Eastern Chipmunk Tamias striatus

Most noticeable around Old Cut Field Station, Long Point.

Muskrat Ondatra zibethicus

Recorded at Hillman Marsh.

American Beaver Castor candensis

2 seen well from the Marsh Boardwalk at Point Pelee.

#### **Reptiles & Amphibians**

Total number of reptiles and amphibians recorded: 3 species

Blanding's Turtle Emydoidea blandingii

Recorded at Point Pelee (De Laurier Trail) and Hillman Marsh.

Midland Painted Turtle Chrysemys picta

Recorded at Point Pelee (De Laurier Trail).

Common Watersnake Nerodia sipedon

One seen at Hillman Marsh on 9th.
