#### **HIGHLIGHTS OF TRIP:**

**Maned Wolf:** One of the stand-out highlights of the tour was enjoying no less than eight different Maned Wolf encounters! Each encounter was a unique experience, with nobody else around, and included both night & day sightings. Simply magical.

**Ocelot:** Two different animals seen very well, each for a prolonged amount of time. Our first sighting was quite exceptional with very close views.

**Jaguar:** Two great sightings, one in daylight and the second at night. Again, both sightings were just our group and no other tourists. A very different experience to the commercial Northern Pantanal.

**Giant Anteater:** Fabulous views of this magnificent mammal with 13 encounters. **Southern Tamandua:** Seen exceptionally well on three occasions and once at night. **Lowland Tapir:** Numerous sightings during the day and night.

White-winged Nightjar: This range restricted species was seen well in Emas NP.

#### **Tour Summary**

This was Wise Birding's first Mostly Mammals tour to Emas National Park and the Southern Pantanal. It was a great success with some fabulous mammal encounters with many of our hoped for target species seen on a number of different occasions. Highlights included Maned Wolf, Jaguar, Ocelot, Giant Anteater, Southern Tamandua, Lowland Tapir, Hoary Fox, Nine-banded and Yellow Armadillos and much more. Despite trying very hard, we were unlucky not to connect with Pampas Cat, but on the flip side we were really spoiled with our sightings of Giant Anteater, Ocelot and Maned Wolf, the latter species seen on eight different occasions including animals in daylight.

Despite being a mammal focused tour, it is impossible not to be distracted by the numerous amazing birds which Brazil also has to offer. We enjoyed great views of many of the iconic Pantanal species like Hyacinth Macaws and Toco Toucans as well as numerous herons, ibis, birds of prey and passerines. We also made an effort to see a number of very localised and range restricted species like White-winged Nightjar and Blaze-winged Parakeet.

Overall it was a tour packed full of wildlife and one that we will certainly be offering in the future and is sure to become a regular fixture in the Wise Birding calendar.

#### **Emas National Park**

The beauty of this National Park is that due to its more "out of the way" location, it tends to be far less visited by wildlife watching tourists. Therefore any wildlife that you do see is a highly memorable experience because you are literally on your own. This was certainly the case for all of our wildlife encounters for the six nights spent here.

If Maned Wolf is a "must see" species and you want to see animals behaving completely naturally without visiting busy tourist sites like Santuario do Caraca, where animals are regularly fed, then a visit to Emas in July is a must! Each of our encounters was very different and quite exceptional in terms of close views and July is a the best time to increase your chances for daylight sightings. Aside from Maned Wolves we also enjoyed many other mammals in Emas including numerous Lowland Tapirs and Striped Hog-nosed Skunks, Hoary Fox, Pampas Deer, fresh tracks of both Puma and Jaguar and very fresh diggings from Giant Armadillo.

Birding here was also exciting with daily sightings of the stunning Blue-and-Yellow Macaws, great views of the range restricted Yellow-faced Parrot and White-winged Nightjar and some Cerrado specialities like White-rumped Tanager, Cock-tailed Tyrant and a beautiful Black-banded Owl.

#### **Southern Pantanal**

Our visit to this internationally famous wildlife rich area of Brazil was in complete contrast to the habitat of Emas NP and therefore resulted in us seeing many new mammal species. The cats were the undoubted highlight for everyone here and we enjoyed two different sightings of both Ocelot and Jaguar.

Our first Ocelot sighting was quite exceptional, as a female approached us on a number of occasions close to the Aquidauana River. Totally unperturbed by our torchlight it came within just a few metres of us! Our second Ocelot encounter was a different experience as we enjoyed prolonged views of another female walking purposefully through the wetland vegetation in the spotlight.

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We worked very hard for our Jaguar sightings, as animals here are far harder to see than the far more commercial Northern Pantanal. The hard work paid off with two sightings on one day! Equally as impressive and high on the wish list for many of the group were the numerous sightings of Giant Anteater, once again at very close range. Southern Tamandua sightings were certainly high up on the list of highlights as were the daily encounters of Nine-banded Armadillos and Yellow Armadillos whilst at Pousada Aguapé. Both Giant and Neotropical Otters, Tayra and Marsh Deer were just some of the other mammal highlights.

Once again, birds were a continual distraction. Examples being the hugely impressive and iconic Hyacinth Macaws as well as a good selection of waterbirds like Jabiru, Maguari Stork and nocturnal species like Great and Common Potoos and Striped Owl.

#### We recorded a total of 184 species of bird and 28 mammals on this tour

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
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


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
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### **Wise Birding Holidays Ltd**

#### Total number of mammals recorded: 28 species

(plus 2 introduced species and tracks only of 2 species)

#### **Giant Anteater**

#### Myrmecophaga tridactyla

Some fabulous views of up to 13 different animals over 5 days. All sightings were during the day except for single animal in Emas NP on the 23rd and Fazenda San Francisco on the 1st August. All other sightings were during the day near Pousada Aguapé where counts of 1 - 4 animals were recorded and a high count of 7 animals on the 30th, including an animal seen by Alison from horseback!

#### Southern Tamandua

#### Tamandua tetradactyla

A very obliging animal was seen as we neared Pousada Aguapé on the 28th and a 2nd animal was seen at dusk the same day. Another 2 animals were recorded on the 31st.

#### Nine-banded Armadillo

#### Dasypus novemcinctus

Excellent views both at night and during the day. Recorded daily between the 28th - 31st with up to 4 animals seen each day.

#### Six-banded (Yellow) Armadillo

#### Euphractus sexcinctus

The commonest Armadillo species recorded on eight days and across all sites.

#### **Giant Armadillo**

#### Priodontes maximus

Fresh diggings and tracks around a huge hole were recorded in Emas NP on the 25th July.

#### Ocelot

#### Leopardus pardalis

One of the tour highlights was an exceptionally close encounter with a female close to the river Aquidauana on the evening of the 29th. A second animal (also female) was seen well whilst walking through vegetation at Fazenda San Francisco on the night of the 31st.

Jaguar Panthera onca

Sightings of Jaguar in the Southern Pantanal are far less regular compared to the busy commercial Northern Pantanal. However, we tried very hard and after seeing Jaguar tracks on three days at Fazenda San Francisco, we were finally rewarded with views of a beautiful female in daylight at Fazenda San Francisco on the 2nd Aug.

It was on the road at 5.33pm and stood in the open for a short while before slinking off into one of the ditches and despite waiting until dusk and driving in darkness, we failed to refind it. A presumably different animal (not sexed) but in a different area to the first sighting was seen at 8.40pm in the spotlight for a few minutes. Initially close, just the other side of a water channel, but then walking slowly away and an exciting end to our final night drive. We also recorded fresh Jaguar tracks in Emas NP on the morning of the 22nd July and in riverine forest near Pousada Aguapé on the 30th.

Puma concolor

Fresh tracks in Emas NP during the early morning of the 26th July.

## Crab-eating Fox

### Cerdocyon thous

The most commonly encountered mammal with daily sightings and counts of up to five animals on one day.

### **Maned Wolf**

# Chrysocyon brachyurus

Another clear tour highlight as we were spoiled with some simply amazing views during our time in Emas NP. Here, we enjoyed 8 separate encounters of at least 5 different animals! Two of the sightings were in daylight (06.40am and 5.45pm on the 27th) and the rest were during darkness by spotlight but all very close and prolonged views. Sadly a long dead animal was the result of a road casualty immediately adjacent to the boundary of Emas NP and a stark reminder at the fragility of this wonderful park.

### **Hoary Fox**

### Lycalopex vetulus

We had two sightings of this strikingly small and shy fox in Emas NP. A brief sighting on the evening of the 23rd and a better view on the evening of the 24th.

### Striped Hog-nosed Skunk

### Conepatus semistriatus

Recorded daily in Emas NP almost exclusively seen at night other than a sighting at dawn on the 27th.

### **South American Coati**

### Nasua nasua

Recorded only during our time at Pousada Aguapé with sightings on the 29th and 30th and a maximum count of 8 animals.

Tayra Eira barbara

A lucky but very welcome sighting of a single animal at Fazenda San Francisco during the late morning of the 1st August as an animal ran across the road.

### **Lesser Grison**

### Galictis cuia

A single animal dashed across the road during one of our many game drives in Emas NP but was only seen well by a couple of the group.

# **Neotropical Otter**

# Lontra longicaudis

A single animal seen well on 2 - 3 occasions during our boat trip on the Aquidauana River on the morning of the 30th July.

**Giant Otter** 

### Pteronura brasiliensis

A frustratingly brief sighting of 2 animals on the 1st Aug during our boat trip on the Corixo Sao Domingos whilst at Fazenda San Francisco.

**Lowland Tapir** 

# Tapirus terrestris

Recorded on seven days with sightings at all three locations though most numerous in Emas NP where a total of 8 animals were recorded. Sightings were most often at night but day time sightings in Emas on 25th, Aguapé on 30th (for Alison on horseback) and 1st Aug at San Francisco. Young stripey juvs were seen in Emas (by thermal) and San Francisco.

**Collared Peccary** 

# Pecari tajacu

Recorded only at Pousada Aguapé on two days. A group of 15 animals crossed the road slowly in front of us at dusk on the 29th and a single on the 30th.

White-lipped Peccary

# Tayassu pecari

At least 8 animals seen well in Emas NP on the evening of the 24th and a single on the 29th near the Aquidauana River on the 29th.

**Eurasian Wild Pig (Introduced)** 

Sus scrofa

Recorded on three days around Pousada Aguapé.

**Marsh Deer** 

Blastocerus dichotomus

This elegant deer was seen on three days whilst at Fazenda San Francisco.

**Common Red Brocket** 

Mazama americana

Single animals in Emas NP adjacent to riverine forest on the 26th and 27th.

**Common Brown Brocket** 

Mazama gouazoubira

A single animal near Pousada Aguapé on the 29th.

**Pampas Deer** 

### Ozotoceros bezoarticus

A very common species in Emas NP with daily sightings of numerous animals and again on two days at Aguapé.

Water Buffalo (Introduced)

Bubalus bubalis

Five animals seen on the 2nd whilst exploring Fazenda San Francisco.

Hooded (Azara's) Capuchin

Sapajus cay

Recorded on two days around Pousada Aguapé and once at Fazenda San Francisco during our boat trip on the Corixo Sao Domingos. Counts of 5, 2 & 7 respectively.

**Black-and-gold Howler** 

Alouatta caraya

Great views of at least 8 animals, including black males and gold females, during our boat trip on the Aquidauana River near Pousada Aquapé on the 30th.

Common Tapeti (Rabbit)

Sylvilagus brasiliensis

Counts of 1-3 recorded on four days in total. A single while travelling from Campo Grande to Emas and all others around Pousada Aguapé and Fazenda San Francisco.

Azara's Agouti

Dasyprocta azarae

Recorded in Emas NP close to our accommodation on 23rd and then 2 animals on the 29th near Pousada Aguapé.

**Brazilian Guinea Pig (Cavy)** 

Cavia aperea

Seen on three days at Fazenda San Francisco, mostly vanishing quickly into vegetation.

**Greater Capybara** 

Hydrochoerus hydrochaeris

Recorded on six days whilst exploring Pousada Aguapé and Fazenda San Francisco.

# **Reptiles & Amphibians**

**Red-footed Tortoise** 

Chelonoidis carbonarius

A great spot by Fiona of this scarce species whilst exploring Pousada Aguapé on the 30th.

House Gecko Hemidactylus mabouia

Recorded on at least two days.

Yacare Caiman yacare Caiman yacare

Recorded on the last six days of the tour.

Black-and-White Tegu

The same male and female seen very well on two different days whilst exploring Emas NP.

**Crossed Pit Viper** 

**Bothrops alternatus** 

Salvator merianae

This beautiful snake was seen at night on the road in Emas NP on the 23rd.

**Parrot Snake** 

A single seen during our final night drive in Fazenda San Francisco.



Total number of birds recorded: 184 species (of which 6 were heard only)

Greater Rhea Rhea americana

Recorded daily.

Undulated Tinamou Crypturellus undulatus

Often heard at dawn, but finally seen whilst exploring Pousada Aguapé on the 29th.

Small-billed Tinamou Crypturellus parvirostris

Two birds flushed off the road in Emas NP on the morning of the 24th.

Red-winged Tinamou Rhynchotus rufescens

Three birds seen well on the 24th whilst exploring the central grassland area of Emas NP.

Southern Screamer Chauna torquata

Seen whilst exploring Fazenda San Francisco with 1 -2 birds seen on two days.

Black-bellied Whistling Duck Dendrocygna autumnalis

Recorded on two days with groups of 7 - 10 birds on two days near Pousada Aguapé.

**Muscovy Duck** 

Cairina moschata

Small numbers on three days whilst exploring Fazenda San Francisco.

**Rusty-margined Guan** 

Penelope superciliaris

Seen only whilst in Emas NP with 1 - 2 birds seen on three days.

White-throated Piping Guan

Pipile grayi

Small numbers seen on seven days.

**Bare-faced Curassow** 

Crax fasciolata

Recorded on seven days whilst in Emas and Aguapé with both males and females seen.

**Nacunda Nighthawk** 

Chordeiles nacunda

Nyctidromus albicollis

Seen at dusk and during night drives on three days at Fazenda San Francisco.

Pauraque Nyctidromu
Recorded daily with some good views on the ground and perched.

Little Nightjar

Setopagis parvula

Heard by all and seen only by CT on the 28th at Aguapé during a night drive on the 28th.

White-winged Nightjar

Eleothreptus candicans

This rare range restricted species was seen very well in Emas NP on the 24th with at least 5 birds seen whilst spotlighting.

Scissor-tailed Nightjar

Hydropsalis torquata

Single birds during night drives in Emas NP and again on three nights whilst spotlighting at Fazenda San Francisco.

**Rufous Nightjar** 

Antrostomus rufus

Heard only during a night drive on the 30th at Pousada Aguapé.

**Great Potoo** 

Nyctibius grandis

A total of 3 birds recorded during a night drive on the 29th at Aguapé, including some great views at dusk of a perched bird.

**Common Potoo** 

Nyctibius griseus

Seen very well during night drives at all three sites. Counts of 1 - 2 birds over five days.

**Swallow-tailed Hummingbird** 

Eupetomena macroura

Seen only in Emas NP on the 22nd.

Gilded Sapphire

Hylocharis chrysura

At least 3 birds seen whilst exploring Aguapé on the 29th.

Guira Cuckoo

Guira guira

Recorded daily.

Smooth-billed Ani

Crotophaga ani

Recorded daily.

Picazuro Pigeon

Patagioenas picazuro

Recorded daily.

**Pale-vented Pigeon** 

Patagioenas cayennensis

Common in Emas NP and also seen at Aguapé on at least one day.

**Scaled Dove** 

Columbina squammata

This common but very attractive dove was recorded daily.

**Ruddy Ground Dove** 

Columbina talpacoti

Recorded on at least 10 days.

**Picui Ground Dove** 

Columbina picui

Recorded on three days around Fazenda San Francisco.

**White-tipped Dove** 

Leptotila verreauxi

Recorded on at least 10 days.

**Grey-fronted Dove** 

Leptotila rufaxilla

Recorded on three days around Fazenda San Francisco.

**Ash-throated Crake** 

Mustelirallus albicollis

Heard only in a wetland area around Fazenda San Francisco on the 31st.

**Grey-cowled Wood Rail** 

Aramides cajaneus

Excellent views of this striking Rail on three days whilst exploring Aguapé.

Limpkin

Aramus guarauna

First seen whilst travelling from Campo Grande to Emas and then again on two days at Fazenda San Francisco.

White-backed Stilt

Himantopus melanurus

Seen whilst travelling to and from Emas and again at Aguapé with 6+ birds on the 29th.

**Southern Lapwing** 

Vanellus chilensis

A common species recorded on ten days.

**Pied Plover** 

Hoploxypterus cayanus

Two these very smart waders were seen well during our boat trip on the Aguidauana River.

Wattled Jacana

Jacana jacana

Recored on five days whilst at Aguapé and Fazenda San Francisco.

**Wood Stork** 

Mycteria americana

Small numbers seen on just two days, at Aguapé and Fazenda San Francisco.

Maguari Stork

Ciconia maguari

This Pantanal speciality was seen well at Aguapé with 2 birds on 28th & a single on 29th.

Jabiru

Jabiru mycteria

Another iconic species of the Pantanal with small numbers seen daily at both Aguapé and Fazenda San Francisco.

**Anhinga** 

Anhinga anhinga

Seen during boat trips on the Aquidauana River and Corixo Sao Domingos.

**Neotropic Cormorant** 

Nannopterum brasilianum

Recorded on four days.

**Plumbeous Ibis** 

Theristicus caerulescens

Counts of 1-2 birds over three days whilst at both South Pantanal lodges.

**Buff-necked Ibis** 

Theristicus caudatus

The commonest ibis species recorded on 12 days.

**Green Ibis** 

Mesembrinibis cayennensis

Recorded on five days at both the South Pantanal lodges.

**Bare-faced Ibis** 

Phimosus infuscatus

Recorded on four days at both the South Pantanal lodges.

Roseate Spoonbill

Platalea ajaja

This beautiful Spoonbill was recorded at Aguapé with 7 birds on 28th and again at Fazenda San Francisco on the 31st.

**Rufescent Tiger Heron** 

Tigrisoma lineatum

Recorded on six days at both the South Pantanal lodges including adults and juveniles.

**Boat-billed Heron** 

Cochlearius cochlearius

Two birds in a wet ditch whilst exploring Fazenda San Francisco on the 1st.

**Black-crowned Night Heron** 

Nycticorax nycticorax

Recorded on four days at both the South Pantanal lodges.

Striated Heron

Butorides striata

Recorded on five days at both the South Pantanal lodges.

**Western Cattle Egret** 

Bubulcus ibis

Recorded on eight days. Travelling to/from Emas NP and at both South Pantanal Lodges.

Cocoi Heron

Ardea cocoi

Recorded on five days at both the South Pantanal lodges.

**Great Egret** 

Ardea alba

Recorded on six days at both the South Pantanal lodges.

Capped Heron

Pilherodius pileatus

Recorded on seven days at all three sites with counts of 1-2 birds.

**Whistling Heron** 

Syrigma sibilatrix

Seen whilst exploring Fazenda San Francisco with birds seen on two days.

**Little Blue Heron** 

Egretta caerulea

A single bird at a wetland near Aguapé on the 29th.

**Snowy Egret** 

Egretta thula

Recorded on four days at both the South Pantanal lodges.

**Black Vulture** 

Coragyps atratus

Recorded on at least six days at all three sites.

**Turkey Vulture** 

Cathartes aura

The most common bird of prey recorded on ten days.

**Lesser Yellow-headed Vulture** 

Cathartes burrovianus

Recorded on six days at both the South Pantanal lodges.

**Long-winged Harrier** 

Circus buffoni

A very smart male cruised past us whilst exploring Emas NP on the afternoon of the 26th.

**Black-collared Hawk** 

Busarellus nigricollis

This attractive Hawk associated with wetland areas was seen well at both South Pantanal lodges over four days.

**Snail Kite** 

Rostrhamus sociabilis

Counts of 1-2 birds at both South Pantanal lodges over five days.

**Crane Hawk** 

Geranospiza caerulescens

This highly distinctive long-tailed and long-legged raptor was seen at Fazenda San Francisco on the 1st.

Savanna Hawk

Buteogallus meridionalis

A common raptor recorded at all sites over 11 days.

Chaco Eagle

Buteogallus coronatus

This localised species was seen very well in Emas NP on the 25th where an immature bird posed for us on top of a pylon.

Roadside Hawk Rupornis magnirostris

A common raptor recorded at all sites over 11 days.

White-tailed Hawk Geranoaetus albicaudatus

Most common in Emas NP but also seen at Fazenda San Francisco on one day.

Grey-lined Hawk Buteo nitidus

A single bird on the 2nd at Fazenda San Francisco.

American Barn Owl Tyto furcata

Exceptional views of birds hunting at night were seen daily whilst in Emas NP with counts of at least five birds. Other singles seen at night at Fazenda San Francisco lodge.

Burrowing Owl Athene cunicularia

Recorded daily whilst in Emas and less frequently at Aguapé and Fazenda San Francisco.

Ferruginous Pygmy Owl Glaucidium brasilianum

Heard and seen very well whilst at Aguapé.

Striped Owl Asio clamator

Fabulous views by spotlight at Fazenda San Francisco on three nights.

Tropical Screech Owl Megascops choliba

Heard at Aguapé and seen very well whilst at Fazenda San Francisco.

Black-banded Owl Strix huhula

A great spot by Fiona as a bird gave wonderful views by spotlight in Emas NP on the 26th. Also heard at Aguapé on the evening of the 30th.

Blue-crowned Trogon Trogon curucui

A single bird seen well at Aguapé on the 31st.

Amazon Kingfisher Chloroceryle amazona

Recorded on five days at both the South Pantanal lodges.

Green Kingfisher Chloroceryle americana

Seen whilst at Aguapé on the 30th.

Ringed Kingfisher Megaceryle torquata

The largest of the Kingfishers and seen on four days at both the South Pantanal lodges.

Rufous-tailed Jacamar Galbula ruficauda

Two birds showed very well whilst exploring Aguapé on the 29th.

White-eared Puffbird Nystalus chacuru

Great views of this Cerrado species whilst in Emas Np with a single bird on the 25th.

Chestnut-eared Aracari Pteroglossus castanotis

Great views of up 2 and 3 birds at Aguapé on the 28th and 29th and a single bird at Fazenda San Francisco on the 1st.

Toco Toucan Ramphastos toco

Fabulous daily sightings of these amazing birds.

White-wedged Piculet Picumnus albosquamatus

Heard only at Aguapé on the 29th.

White Woodpecker *Melanerpes candidus* 

Two birds seen in Emas NP on the 27th.

Little Woodpecker Veniliornis passerinus

Seen well at Aguapé on the 29th.

**Campo Flicker** 

Colaptes campestris

Recorded on eight days with daily sightings in Emas NP.

**Pale-crested Woodpecker** 

Celeus lugubris

Singles on the 31st and 1st whilst at Fazenda San Francisco.

**Crimson-crested Woodpecker** 

Campephilus melanoleucos

Two birds at Aguapé on the 29th.

**Red-legged Seriema** 

Cariama cristata

Recorded on 11 days. Great views in Emas NP in particular and again at Aguapé.

Crested Caracara plancus

Recorded daily.

**Yellow-headed Caracara** 

Milvago chimachima

Recorded in Emas NP on here days with coins of 1-2 birds.

Laughing Falcon

Herpetotheres cachinnans

Great views of 2 birds in Emas NP on the 22nd.

American Kestrel

Falco sparverius

Seen in Emas NP on two days.

**Aplomado Falcon** 

Falco femoralis

Recorded daily in Emas NP.

**Bat Falcon** 

Falco rufigularis

A pair of perched birds at Aguapé on the 29th.

**Monk Parakeet** 

Myiopsitta monachus

Recorded on eight days.

**Yellow-chevroned Parakeet** 

Brotogeris chiriri

Recorded on eight days.

**Scaly-headed Parrot** 

Pionus maximiliani

Two birds seen well at Fazenda San Francisco on the 2nd.

**Blue-headed Parrot** 

Pionus menstruus

Great views of a single bird in Emas NP on the 22nd was unexpected for the area.

**Yellow-faced Parrot** 

Alipiopsitta xanthops

Excellent views of small flocks in Emas NP on 23rd and 24th of this very localised species.

**Turquoise-fronted Amazon** 

Amazona aestiva

The commonest of the Amazon Parrots seen on nine days.

**Orange-winged Amazon** 

Amazona amazonica

Small numbers seen whilst at Aguapé on two days.

**Blaze-winged Parakeet** 

Pyrrhura devillei

Five of this range restricted species seen exceptionally well on the morning of the 30th close to our accommodation at Aguapé on the 30th.

**Hyacinth Macaw** 

Anodorhynchus hyacinthinus

This hugely impressive Macaw was seen very well at both the South Pantanal lodges.

**Peach-fronted Parakeet** 

Eupsittula aurea

This very attractive and common Parakeet was seen on ten days.

**Nanday Parakeet** 

Aratinga nenday

Another highly attractive Parakeet and seen very well whilst at Aguapé on four days.

### **Golden-collared Macaw**

### Primolius auricollis

Poor views of 2 birds in flight at Aguapé on the 29th. This was improved on when at Fazenda San Francisco on the 2nd, where two perched birds posed for us all.

# Blue-and-yellow Macaw

### Ara ararauna

One of the highlights of Emas NP was the daily sight and sound of these fabulous birds and in such large numbers. Smaller counts whilst at Aguapé.

# **Red-and-green Macaw**

# Ara chloropterus

Much scarcer than the above species but we enjoyed greta views of 2 birds on the 28th and 29th whilst exploring Aguapé.

# **Red-shouldered Macaw**

# Diopsittaca nobilis

This small Macaw was seen in small numbers on four days. Two in Emas NP and two whilst at Aguapé.

### **Blue-crowned Parakeet**

# Thectocercus acuticaudatus

Seen well on two days whilst exploring Fazenda San Francisco.

## **Narrow-billed Woodcreeper**

# Lepidocolaptes angustirostris

Seen well near the Aguidauana River on the 29th.

# **Pale-legged Hornero**

# Furnarius leucopus

More commonly associated with water than Rufous Hornero. Seen whilst exploring Fazenda San Francisco with birds seen on two days.

**Rufous Hornero** 

### Furnarius rufus

Commoner than the above species and recorded on seven days.

### **Grey-crested Cacholote**

# Pseudoseisura unirufa

Seen very well whilst exploring Aguapé with birds seen on three days.

# Yellow-chinned Spinetail

# Certhiaxis cinnamomeus

Seen whilst exploring the wetland areas of both South Pantanal lodges.

### **Chotoy Spinetail**

### Schoeniophylax phryganophilus

Heard only on the 29th whilst at Aguapé.

**Great Antshrike** 

Taraba major

Seen very well whilst exploring Aguapé on the 29th.

**Mato Grosso Antbird** 

Cercomacra melanaria

Heard only on the 29th and 30th at Aguapé.

**Southern Beardless Tyrannulet** 

Camptostoma obsoletum

Recorded on at least the 29th around Aguapé.

**Pearly-vented Tody-Tyrant** 

Hemitriccus margaritaceiventer

Seen well at Aguapé on the 30th.

**Common Tody-Flycatcher** 

Todirostrum cinereum

Seen well in Emas NP and Aguapé.

# **Scarlet Flycatcher**

# Pyrocephalus rubinus

Seen well on at least three days whilst exploring both South Pantanal lodges.

White-rumped Monjita

Xolmis valets

A very common species recorded daily.

White Monjita

Xolmis irupero

Seen on the 28th near Aguapé.

Streamer-tailed Tyrant

Gubernetes yetapa

This impressive species was seen very well in Emas NP on the 22nd and 26th.

**Black-backed Water Tyrant** 

Fluvicola albiventer

Small numbers recorded on three days whilst exploring both South Pantanal lodges.

**White-headed Marsh Tyrant** 

Arundinicola leucocephala

Recorded at Fazenda San Francisco on the 2nd.

**Cock-tailed Tyrant** 

Alectrurus tricolor

This speciality of the Cerrado was seen well in Emas NP with at least 6 birds on the 24th.

Cattle Tyrant *Machetornis rixosa* 

Recorded on eight days.

**Rusty-margined Flycatcher** 

Myiozetetes cayanensis

Four birds in a small patch of woodland near Aguapé on the 29th.

Recorded on at least seven days.

Lesser Kiskadee

**Great Kiskadee** 

Philohydor lictor

Pitangus sulphuratus

Most associated with wetland areas and seen well on two boat trips at both Aguapé and Fazenda San Francisco.

**Tropical Kingbird** 

Tyrannus melancholicus

Recorded on at least two days.

**Rufous Casiornis** 

Casiornis rufus

Excellent views in a small patch of woodland whilst exploring Aguapé on the 29th.

**Swainson's Flycatcher** 

Myiarchus swainsoni

A calling bird in a small patch of woodland whilst exploring Aguapé on the 29th.

**Short-crested Flycatcher** 

Myiarchus ferox

The distinctive call of this species was heard and seen well in Emas NP on two days.

**Helmeted Manakin** 

Antilophia galeata

Both male and female seen and heard near our accommodation in Emas NP on two days.

**Band-tailed Manakin** 

Pipra fasciicauda

This stunning Manakin was seen exceptionally well in woodland adjacent to the Aquidauana River on the 30th.

**Rufous-browed Peppershrike** 

Cyclarhis gujanensis

Heard only on at least one day whilst at Aguapé.

Purplish Jay

Cyanocorax cyanomelas

Recorded on three days whilst at both South Pantanal lodges.

**Curl-crested Jay** 

Cyanocorax cristatellus

This impressive Jay was seen very well and recorded on eight days.

**Plush-crested Jay** 

Cyanocorax chrysops

This localised and again impressive Jay species was recorded at both South Pantanal lodges over three days.

White-rumped Swallow

Tachycineta leucorrhoa

Small numbers recorded on five days across all sites.

White-winged Swallow

Tachycineta albiventer

Small numbers recorded on two days whilst exploring Fazenda San Francisco.

Southern Rough-winged Swallow Stelgidopteryx ruficollis

Recorded on two days.

Grey-breasted Martin Progne chalybea

Recorded on two days.

Black-capped Donacobius Donacobius atricapilla

Seen very well at Fazenda San Francisco on the 1st.

Thrush-like Wren Campylorhynchus turdinus

Recorded on four days whilst at both South Pantanal lodges.

Fawn-breasted Wren Cantorchilus guarayanus

Seen and heard very well at Aguapé on the 29th.

Chalk-browed Mockingbird Mimus saturninus

Recorded on nine days.

Pale-breasted Thrush Turdus leucomelas

Seen on two days in woodland whilst in Emas NP.

Rufous-bellied Thrush Turdus rufiventris

Recorded on the 30th at Aguapé.

House Sparrow Passer domesticus

This introduced species was recorded on four days.

Yellowish Pipit Anthus chii

Seen on the 30th at Aguapé.

Grassland Sparrow Ammodramus humeralis

Recorded in Emas NP on two days.

White-browed Blackbird Leistes superciliaris

A single bird on the 2nd whilst exploring Fazenda San Francisco.

Crested Oropendola Psarocolius decumanus

Seen whilst exploring Fazenda San Francisco on at least one day.

Solitary Cacique Cacicus solitarius

Seen whilst exploring Fazenda San Francisco on at least one day.

Golden-winged Cacique Cacicus chrysopterus

This very localised species was seen well at Fazenda San Francisco on the 2nd.

Orange-backed Troupial Icterus croconotus

This fluorescent stunner was seen very well along the Aquidauana River on the 30th.

Giant Cowbird *Molothrus oryzivorus* 

Small numbers in the grassland areas of both South Pantanal lodges over five days.

Shiny Cowbird *Molothrus bonariensis* 

Seen on at least two days whilst exploring Fazenda San Francisco.

Chopi Blackbird Gnorimopsar chopi

A very common species recorded on ten days.

Unicolored Blackbird Agelasticus cyanopus

Seen whilst exploring Fazenda San Francisco with birds seen on two days.

Yellow-rumped Marshbird Pseudoleistes guirahuro

Seen on two days whilst exploring just outside Emas NP with counts of 10 - 12 birds.

**Flavescent Warbler** 

Myiothlypis flaveola

Seen well outside our accommodation in Emas NP on the 23rd.

Coal-crested Finch

Charitospiza eucosma

Another Cerrado speciality seen very well on three days in Emas NP.

**Hooded Tanager** 

Nemosia pileata

Seen well near Aguapé on the 29th.

Wedge-tailed Grass Finch

Emberizoides herbicola

Seen well in Emas NP on at least one day.

Swallow Tanager

Tersina viridis

A female at Aguapé seen by John W.

**Black-throated Saltator** 

Saltatricula atricollis

Seen daily whilst in Emas NP and again on the 29th near Aguapé.

Bananaquit

Coereba flaveola

Recorded on the 28th at a coffee stop whilst travelling to Aguapé.

**Blue-black Grassquit** 

Volatinia jacarina

Seen in Emas NP on at least one day.

**Grey-headed Tanager** 

Eucometis penicillata

A single bird on the 30th alongside the Aquidauana River during our boat trip.

Silver-beaked Tanager

Ramphocelus carbo

Seen whilst exploring Aguapé with birds seen on two days.

**Plumbeous Seedeater** 

Sporophila plumbea

Seen well in Emas NP on four days.

**Rusty-collared Seedeater** 

Sporophila collaris

This striking Seedeater posed for us near Aguapé on the 29th.

White-rumped Tanager

Cypsnagra hirundinacea

This Cerrado specialist was seen very well in Emas NP on at least three days with birds displaying and calling to each other.

Saffron Finch

Sicalis flaveola

Small flocks recorded on nine days.

**Red-crested Cardinal** 

Paroaria coronata

Seen well at both South Pantanal lodges over three days.

**Yellow-billed Cardinal** 

Paroaria capitata


Seen well at both South Pantanal lodges over five days.
