HIGHLIGHTS OF TRIP

Eurasian Lynx: Voted "bird" of the trip! An incredible sighting for 45 minutes (on and off) out in the open near Kazbegi was a memory never to be forgotten. Video HERE **Caucasian Snowcock & Caucasian Black Grouse:** Great sightings of both of these key species were enjoyed during our stay at Kazbegi.

Armash Ponds Warblers: Menetries's, Paddyfield, Moustached, Savi's and Great Reed Warblers were enjoyed as we explored this internationally important site. **Great Rosefinch:** A flock of 18 birds in the sleet and rain at Kazbegi.

Honey Buzzard Migration: Almost daily movements with high counts of 250+ birds. **Brown Bear & Cubs:** A wonderful sighting of a mother and three cubs whilst scanning for Caspian Snowcock. **Video HERE** courtesy of D Shoshitashvili

Summary

This was Wise Birding's first tour to Georgia and Armenia and following such a successful tour it is sure to be a regular destination on our calendar of tour. Quite simply both Georgia and Armenia have fabulous birding, great food, wonderful accommodation and hospitality, spectacular scenery and fantastic mammals too!

Our tour began in the spectacular Greater Caucasus Mountains and the small mountain village of Stepantsminda, or Kazbegi as it is better known. It was a truly impressive journey as we worked our way up into the mountains and over the Jvari Pass. Our three nights here allowed us ample time to see some target species with great views of both Caucasian Snowcocks and Caucasian Grouse, but the good clear sunny weather and high snow line made it difficult to locate some of the other high altitude species, despite walking up to 2,700M! However, it was a certainly a memorable walk surrounded by stunning scenery and although we found no Güldenstädt's Redstart, some poor weather on our final morning produced a very welcome flock of 18 Great Rosefinches. Of course we cannot forget the amazing views we enjoyed of Eurasian Lynx and Brown Bear on one particular morning! A visit to the lowlands and Steppe country of Georgia gave a very different experience and many more birds. Visits to both Kumisi and Jandari Lakes allowed us to see a good selection of wetland birds including both Collared and Black-winged Pratincoles and Eastern Imperial Eagle, whereas the Steppe areas and David Gareja produced Calandra Larks, Pied Wheatear and Eastern Orphean Warbler.

In Armenia, the lush deciduous forest of Dilijan NP greeted us and we enjoyed the wonderful sights and sounds of Semicollared Flycatchers and Green Warblers. Then down to the lower elevation at Lake Sevan where Pygmy Cormorants and Armenia Gulls dominated our daily counts of birds. Crossing over the Vardenyats Pass at around 2,400M was a memorable day as we enjoyed singing Radde's Accentor and Bluethroat with a backdrop of White-winged Terns feeding over a mountain pool. The spectacular scenery continued as we visit the Yeghegnadzor region and the Gndasar Mountains where one of the tour highlights was seeing a female Brown Bear with three cubs to the sound of calling Caspian Snowcocks!

A visit to the lowlands and the Armash Fishponds was also a highlight whilst in Armenia. This internationally recognised site is an Important Bird Area (IBA) and we enjoyed wonderful views of Menetries's Warbler, Moustached and Paddyfield Warblers as well as the beautiful White-tailed Lapwings and White-headed Ducks. The nearby Urts Mountains produced the hoped for Red-tailed Wheatear. A visit to the slopes of Mount Aragats, Armenia's highest mountain at just over 4,000M, was an exciting day with fabulous views of White-throated Robins, Rufous-tailed Rock Thrushes, migrating Honey Buzzards & Horned Larks in the snow. Our final day was mostly travelling back through Armenia and into Georgia, but we had a very enjoyable afternoon in a park to the SW of Tbilisi where we enjoyed great views of Semicollared Flycatchers, Ehrenberg's Redstart and Caucasian Squirrels.

A huge thanks to Dachi for all his hard work in ensuring a fun and successful tour.

We recorded a total of 211 species of bird and 7 mammals on this tour.







Recorded around the Kazbegi mountains on the 26th and 27th April with a high count of 3 birds. A single bird also in Armenia on the 5th May in the Aragats.

Levant Sparrowhawk

We were very fortunate to connect with some raptor passage whilst close to the Russian border in the Darialy valley and this included small flocks of this species and a total of 46 birds recorded.

Eurasian Sparrowhawk

Recorded on six days (four whilst in GE) and a high count of 6 birds on the 28th.

Northern Goshawk

Single birds in Armenia on the 1st and 5th May.

Western Marsh Harrier

Recorded in both countries over five days with a max. count of 40 birds on the 1st May at Lake Sevan (AM).

Pallid Harrier

At least 1 adult male recorded on the 27th April during some impressive raptor migration in the Darialy Valley. Plus other probable ringtails on at least two days, but not seen well enough to confirm the identification from the similar Montagu's Harrier.

Montagu's Harrier

Recorded in both countries over at least five days. Mostly 1-2 birds other than an impressive 13 birds on the 27th April in the Darialy Valley (GE).

Black Kite

Recorded in both countries over five days with a high count of 20 birds during an impressive afternoon of raptor migration on the 27th April (GE).

White-tailed Eagle

An adult at Jandari Lake (GE) on the 30th April and an immature overhead whilst checking the area below the Aragats Mountains (AM) for Bimaculated Lark.

Long-legged Buzzard
