## **HIGHLIGHTS OF TRIP**

**Caucasian Snowcock & Caspian Snowcock:** Great views of both species were enjoyed during our stays at Kazbegi in Georgia and Yeghegnadzor Mts in Armenia. **Great Rosefinch:** A small group of birds including some stunning males at Kazbegi. **Güldenstädt's Redstart:** Fabulous views every day whilst in Kazbegi.

Levant Sparrowhawk: Perfect views of a perched bird at very close range.

Radde's Accentor: A singing male posed beautifully for us in Armenia.

**Armash Fishponds:** Menetries's, Paddyfield, Moustached and Savi's Warblers as well as White-tailed Lapwings were enjoyed at this internationally important site.

**Red-tailed and Finsch's Wheatears:** Visits to the Oorts Mts and Vedi Gorge allowed for some great views of these two sought after species.

Bimaculated Lark: At least 3 birds seen well in flight and on the ground.

**Brown Bear & Cubs:** A wonderful sighting of a mother and two cubs whilst scanning for Caspian Snowcock! **See video <u>HERE</u>**

#### Summary

*This was Wise Birding's second tour to Georgia and Armenia. Quite simply both Georgia and Armenia have fabulous birding, great food, wonderful accommodation and hospitality, spectacular scenery and fantastic mammals too!* 

Our tour began in the spectacular Greater Caucasus Mountains and the small mountain village of Stepantsminda, or Kazbegi as it is better known. It was a truly impressive journey as we worked our way up into the mountains and over the Jvari Pass. Our three nights here allowed us ample time to see some target species with great views of both Caucasian Snowcocks and Caucasian Grouse. Luckily, this year the weather was in our favour and the snow had pushed down the other key target species, so finding both Great Rosefinch and Güldenstädt's Redstart was far easier this year! Of course, Wallcreepers and Bearded Vultures were also a fabulous distraction, as was the stunning scenery! Our accommodation was in the best place for birding and we were truly spoiled with food and hospitality at this friendly family run hotel. A visit to the lowland forests and Steppe country of Georgia gave a very different experience and many more birds. Visits to Kumisi Lake, Krtsanisi and Kojori Forest allowed us to see a good selection of woodland and wetland birds including Levant Sparrowhawk, 6 species of woodpecker, Krüper's Nuthatch and Demoiselle Cranes whereas the Steppe area and David Gareja produced Calandra Larks & Pied Wheatear.

In Armenia, the lush deciduous forest of Dilijan NP greeted us and we enjoyed the wonderful sights and sounds of Semicollared Flycatchers and Green Warblers. Then down to the lower elevation at Lake Sevan where White-winged Terns and Armenian Gulls dominated our daily counts of birds. Crossing over the Vardenyats Pass at around 2,400M was a memorable day as we enjoyed singing Radde's Accentor and Bluethroat with a backdrop of stunning scenery and a visit to the Silk Road. The spectacular scenery continued as we visit the Yeghegnadzor region and the Gndasar Mountains where one of the tour highlights was seeing a female Brown Bear with two cubs and Caspian Snowcock all within minutes of each other!

A visit to the lowlands and the Armash Fishponds was also a highlight whilst in Armenia. This internationally recognised site is an Important Bird Area (IBA) and we enjoyed wonderful views of Menetries's Warbler, Moustached and Paddyfield Warblers as well as the beautiful White-tailed Lapwings and White-headed Ducks. The nearby Oorts Mountains produced the hoped for Red-tailed Wheatear and some great views of Eastern Orphean Warblers. A visit to the farmland below the slopes of Mount Aragats, Armenia's highest mountain at just over 4,000M, was an exciting day. Here we enjoyed singing Bimaculated Larks and a mixed flock of Ortolan Buntings and Redthroated Pipits and Lesser Grey Shrike nearby too. The mountain road gave a different experience seeing Twite and Horned Larks in the snow and a lovely Lesser Spotted Eagle lower down. Our final day was mostly travelling back through Armenia and into Georgia, but we had an enjoyable visit to the local rubbish dump(!) where we had great views of Egyptian Vultures directly overhead.

A huge thanks to Dachi for all his hard work in ensuring a fun and successful tour.

#### We recorded a total of 221 species of bird and 6 mammals on this tour.

A single bird flushed on the 29th at David Gareja was seen in flight by some of the group. Up to 3 birds were also seen and heard by some on the 4th at Mount Aragats and a final bird was heard calling on the 5th at our lunch stop in Armenia, close to the Georgia border.

#### **Chukar Partridge**

Heard only in both Georgia and Armenia.

### Alpine Swift

Our only sighting was of 30+ birds from the Gdauri VP near Kazbegi on the 28th.

Recorded on nine days. Great to see so many screaming groups with thousands of birds in Armenia!

The best sightings were in the Dilijan Forest (AM) where up to 4 birds were present. **Black Redstart** Phoenicurus ochruros A common species, particularly in mountainous areas. Recorded on seven days and the red-bellied subsp. ochruros. Common "Ehrenberg's" Redstart Phoenicurus phoenicurus Counts of up to 10 birds (males & females) recorded in both countries over eight days. Of the males, most were the subsp. phoenicurus. A male in Dilijan Forest on two days showed a strong white wing panel and was presumed to be of the **subsp.** samamisicus. Güldenstädt's Redstart Phoenicurus erythrogastrus The weather was in our favour to see this sometimes tricky and very beautiful species! We recorded birds on three days in Kazbegi with max. day counts of 7, 12 and 21 birds. Monticola saxatilis **Common Rock Thrush** Two birds in Kazbegi (GE) and then birds in Armenia on two days with counts of 2 birds at Yeghegnadzor and 2 birds in the Aragats Mountains on our last day. Blue Rock Thrush Monticola solitarius Counts of 1-2 birds in both countries over three days. Whinchat Saxicola rubetra Recorded in both countries over six days with highest day counts of 8 in GE and 6 in AM. **European Stonechat** Saxicola rubicola The only sighting was at David Gareja (GE) on the 29th April. **Northern Wheatear** Oenanthe oenanthe Small numbers recorded, mostly in the mountains, on seven days. **Isabelline Wheatear** Oenanthe isabellina Recorded in Armenia on two days and Georgia on our last day. Eastern Black-eared Wheatear Oenanthe melanoleuca Recorded in both countries over seven days, but most sightings in Armenia. **Pied Wheatear** Oenanthe pleschanka A female near David Gareja on the 29th. **Finsch's Wheatear** Oenanthe finschii Four birds seen well at Vedi Gorge in Armenia on the afternoon of the 2nd. **Red-tailed Wheatear** Oenanthe chrysopygia A singing and displaying male in the Oorts Mountains was a highlight.

This stunning species posed beautifully on a number of occasions in Armenia with both

males and females seen on two days including a female nest building.
