HIGHLIGHTS OF TRIP:

Snow Leopard: The undoubted tour highlight was watching a male Snow Leopard on

two separate days with incredible views at distances of less than 200 metres.

Pallas's Cat: Great sightings of animal for over 1.5hrs in the Yol Valley.

Przewalski's Horse: At least 20 animals seen in Hustai NP.

Mongolian Gazelle: Herds of over 300 animals seen on the snow covered Steppe.

Goitered Gazelle: A single animal near the Flaming Cliffs in Ömnögovi Province.

Siberian Ibex: Daily sightings of up to 50 animals whilst scanning for cats!

Pallas's Sandgrouse, Mongolian Ground-Jay, Mongolian Lark & Azure Tit:

Just a few of the bird highlights on this mostly mammal focused tour.

Tour Summary

This was Wise Birding's fifth tour to Mongolia but the first during the winter months. In fact, we believe this tour was the first dedicated mid winter Snow Leopard tour to Mongolia by a UK wildlife watching company, therefore we were determined to make it a success! The focus of the tour was to see both Snow Leopard and Pallas's Cat during the mating season when Snow Leopards in particular, become more visible and vocal and easier to track in snow. Similarly Pallas's Cat are also active at this time.

A winter visit to Mongolia for wildlife is of course very much about quality over quantity! Many of the smaller mammals are hibernating or simply less active in the colder temperatures and many of the birds have left the country until Spring. However, if both cats are on your wish list then this is a great time of year to visit. Temperatures in winter can vary but on this tour the average day temperatures were around -10C and dropped to -20C at night and this is typical for early February. Despite sleeping in traditional Gers for much of the tour, one important factor was that we were never cold due to the ever glowing wood-burning stoves in each Ger! The food in Mongolia was, as always, very good and despite our remote location we were incredibly well looked after with a variety of meals and we were never hungry.

Was the tour a success?

Both target species seen incredibly well and hopefully the photos and video speak for themselves. In addition, we also saw a good selection of other mammals and birds. So we very much look forward to our return in 2024.......

<u>Ulaanbaatar (UB) to Dalanzadgad (DZ)</u>

The distance between the new Chinghis Khaan airport (50Km from UB) and DZ is around 540Km and the journey takes around 6.5 hours on a good tarmac road. Travelling across the vast open Steppe to DZ produced some impressive herds of Mongolian Gazelle and a small group of active Mongolian Jirds. In addition to mammals we enjoyed good views of a number of birds including Cinereous Vulture, Upland Buzzard and small flocks of Mongolian Larks over the snow dusted landscape. A halfway lunch stop at Mandalgovi broke the journey and we arrived by 6pm.

The Gurvan Saikhan (Beautiful) Mountains & Yol Valley

After a very comfortable night at our hotel in DZ, we met for breakfast and then headed straight out to the Gurvan Saikhan Mountains ready for our cat quest! Our local guides have been studying the Snow Leopards in these mountains in the Ömnögovi Province of southern Mongolia for many years and as a result they have a great network of local herders that help monitor and keep them updated on the latest Snow Leopard sightings. Many tour companies offering Snow Leopard tours tend to travel much further west into the Khovd region and the Altai Mountains, but this is really not necessary if you wish to see both Snow Leopard and Pallas's Cat.

Our plan was to stay in Gers with a local herding family, a drive of around 2hrs from our hotel. We decided to head straight to the nearby Snow Leopard hotspot close to our camp and literally within five minutes of us arriving, our local guide found a sleeping Snow Leopard! We all knew this could be our only sighting, so we simply made ourselves comfortable at a suitable vantage point and spent the next 8 hours simply immersing ourselves in the moment, surrounded by spectacular mountains watching an amazing animal that we had all travelled specifically to see.

Needless to say, it was a very memorable day as we watched a very relaxed male Snow Leopard at an amazingly close distance of under 200 metres. The weather was calm and sunny and the temperature between -8C and -3C throughout the day as we simply enjoyed observing the cat washing, yawning, sleeping, changing position and of course more sleeping! Our hot lunch brought to us by our amazing hosts and we had time to take in the amazing landscape whilst we waited until early evening when we hoped the cat would become more active. At around 5.45pm it sat up, had a good wash and strolled across the amazing landscape in full view. It showed off that exquisite long tail with striking white underside and then proceeded to mark its territory and then melted out of view. We always had a flexible itinerary dependent on our success with the leopard, but in the end we spent a total of three nights at our base camp. We were staying with a local herding family and were exceptionally well looked after with warmth and food! The beauty of the camp was that we were just a few minutes from our Snow Leopard valley and more importantly, we were supporting the local herders and promoting Snow Leopard tourism in order to help reduce Snow Leopard conflicts with herders.

Things were hard to beat after the success of our first day and despite checking the valley the next day we had no further leopard sightings. We did of course enjoy more sightings of Siberian Ibex and Bearded Vultures. However on our third day we found the same male Snow Leopard in almost the same spot and had another full day of observation and of course to try and improve on photos and video! It remained overcast all day and was colder at around -11C for most of the day, but yet again we had fabulous views as we watched the animal from 09.30am - 6.30pm and enjoyed the luxury of another hot lunch in the field.

Following our early success with Snow Leopard we decided to change base camp so we could focus on searching for Pallas's Cat. Our focus was the nearby Yol Valley. We spent a couple of days and a number of hours scanning and had success on our third attempt. Whilst sat at our vantage point at around 2,450M and surrounded by ever impressive snow covered mountains, we watched this funny cat for around 1.5 hours. The distance was far greater than the Snow Leopard but the views were prolonged and excellent in the scope. It literally looked like a large round ball of fluff as it busily scuttled around the mountain slopes investigating numerous boulders and gulleys.

Aside from cats, our time in these two amazing sites allowed us to enjoy many other sightings of birds and mammals that distracted us while searching for our key target species. Highlights included daily sightings of Siberian Ibex, some great views of Argali, a single Goitered Gazelle, Tolai Hare and some fabulous views of Bearded Vulture, Saker Falcon and Golden Eagle. Plus speciality birds such as Mongolian Ground-Jay, Pallas's Sandgrouse and Brown Accentor.

After an early departure from our base camp in Yol Valley, we made the return journey to UB where more very large groups of Mongolian Gazelle were seen and an all too brief view of a Corsac Fox! We spent the late afternoon birding around our hotel by the Tuul river. It was very productive with many quality species including Black-throated and Red-throated Thrushes, Azure Tit, Siberian Long-tailed Rosefinch and Daurian Partridge.

Hustai National Park


After a very welcome shower and comfortable night in our hotel we headed out early for a final day in Hustai National Park, around 1.5 hours drive west of UB. Here, our main target species was the Przewalski's Horse. Also called the Takhi this horse, originally native to the steppes of Central Asia and named after the Russian geographer and explorer Nikolay Przhevalsky, was re-introduced to Hustai in 1992.

A very enjoyable day was spent exploring the park where we enjoyed views of the horses as well as the recently split Wapiti, plus more views Argali and Mongolian Gazelle. We had hoped to see Wolves and we came very close as a number of animals were heard howling at sunset, but we simply an out of light! Regardless, it was an exciting end to the tour and we cannot wait to return!


















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







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








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




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The following bird checklist follows the nomenclature and classification from Gill F, D Donsker & P Rasmussen (Eds). 2022. IOC World Bird List (v13.1). https://www.worldbirdnames.org/new/
The mammal checklist mostly follows the IUCN framework (Red List) but also the Global Biodiversity Information Facility (GBIF) www.gbif.org and Handbook of The Mammals of the World.

The IOC World Bird List complements three other primary world bird lists that differ slightly in their primary goals and taxonomic philosophy, i.e. The Clements Checklist of the Birds of the World, The Howard & Moore Complete Checklist of the Birds of the World, 4th Edition and HBW Alive/Bird Life

Total number of mammals recorded: 14 species (Wolf heard only)

Pallas's Cat

Otocolobus manul

A number of hours spent scanning from our viewpoint at 2,450M in the Yol Valley finally paid off as we enjoyed fabulous scope views of a single animal for over an hour. We watched it explore the mountain slopes and snow covered rocks during the late afternoon/early evening of the 3rd.

Snow Leopard

Pathera uncia

The undoubted tour highlight was watching a male Snow Leopard on two separate days with over 17 hours viewing time! The distance of the sightings varied from 200 - 600M and allowed ample time for us to absorb the moment and appreciate the full beauty of this amazing looking cat.



Grey Wolf

Canis lupus

Frustratingly animals were only heard at dusk whilst exploring Hustai NP. We came very close to finding them, but we ran out of light! Regardless, it was an exciting end to the tour.

Corsac Fox

Vulpes corsac

All sightings were in darkness except for one animal sat outside its hole whilst we travelled to Ulaanbaatar on the 6th. The sightings in darkness were on the 1st near the Beautiful Mountains, the 6th near our camp by Yol Valley & the 7th by the Tuul river near our hotel.

Red Fox

Vulpes vulpes

Regularly encountered both by day and night with sightings of 1 - 2 animals over six days.

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Przewalski's Horse

Equus ferus przewalskii

Small groups totalling around 20 animals seen well in Hustai NP on the 7th.

Wapiti

Cervus canadensis sibiricus

A minimum of 40 animals were seen whilst we explored Hustai NP.

Siberian Ibex

Capra sibrica

Many good views over five days whilst scanning for Snow Leopards in the Beautiful Mountains. Counts varied from 4 - 26 individuals.

Goitered Gazelle

Gazella subgutturosa yarkendensis

A single animal at the "Flaming Cliffs" was flushed from cover giving some good views initially before it ran out of our view.

Argali

Ovis ammon

Recorded on three days. Up to 10 animals recorded on the 3rd whilst scanning for Pallas's Cat and a count of 3 animals the next day. Two animals also seen in Hustai NP on the 7th.

Mongolian Gazelle

Procapra gutturosa

Great to see the impressive herds whilst exploring the Steppe. Animals were recorded at various sites over seven days with counts of 300+ animals.

Tolai Hare

Lepus tolai

At least one animal seen at the "Flaming Cliffs" disturbed during the day on the 2nd and then another at night whilst spotlighting in the Yol Valley on the same day.

Pallas's Pika

Ochotona pallasi

A limited number of sightings due to the cold weather with animals recorded on three days with just 1-2 animals being seen. The best views were in the Yol Valley.

Mongolian Jird

Meriones unguiculatus

During the winter months most small mammals in Mongolia are either hibernating or active only during warmer temperatures and sunny days. Therefore we were pleased to find 10+ active animals outside their burrows on a sunny day when travelling to Dalanzadgad on the 29th.



Total number of birds recorded: 43 species



Ruddy Shelduck

Tadorna ferruginea

Two birds at the Tuul river on the afternoon of the 6th.

Common Merganser

Mergus merganser

Five birds on the Tuul river on the afternoon of the 6th.

Daurian Partridge

Perdix dauurica

Very easy to see in winter. A group of 11 birds beside the Mongolica Hotel on the afternoon of the 6th and a total of 16 birds (a group of 9 and 7 birds) in Hustai NP on the 7th.

Chukar Partridge

Alectoris chukar

A total of 8 birds on the 31st whilst in the Beautiful Mountains.

Pallas's Sandgrouse

Syrrhaptes paradoxus

Two birds on 2nd whilst exploring the Steppe near the Yol Valley were superseded by a flock of 70+ birds on the 5th, plus smaller flocks of 3 - 10 birds later the same day.

Rock Dove Columba livia

Small groups recorded on eight days including many pure looking birds in the mountains.

Hill Pigeon

Columba rupestris

Recorded on four days with day counts of between 20 - 40 birds.

Bearded Vulture

Gypaetus barbatus

Recorded on seven days with counts of 1 - 3 birds and many superb views.

Cinereous Vulture

Aegypius monachus

Recorded daily with some very close views. Daily counts of between 1 - 12 birds.

Golden Eagle

Aquila chrysaetos

Many great views with birds recorded on five days whilst scanning for cats! Day counts of 1 - 2 birds and nearly all sightings appeared to be adult birds.

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Upland Buzzard

Buteo hemilasius

Small numbers recorded on just four days with a high count of 6 birds on the 6th while travelling from Dalanzadgad to Ulaanbaatar.

Little Owl Athene noctua

Heard calling from our camp in the Beautiful Mountains on 31st and then seen on the 1st.

Lesser Spotted Woodpecker

Dryobates minor

Male and female birds seen very well along the Tuul river on the afternoon of the 6th. The subspecies is *kamtschatkensis*.

Common Kestrel

Falco tinnunculus

Two birds seen well at a random stop between Ulaanbaatar and Dalanzadgad on the 29th.

Merlin Falco columbarius

Two adult males and a female/imm bird were seen hunting passerines at the Baraduuz Plantation on the afternoon of the 5th. Another bird, thought to be this species was seen hunting larks on the 3rd but only seen briefly whilst travelling.

Saker Falcon Falco cherrug

A single bird on the 1st and then 2 birds on the 3rd. The species is considered rare during the winter but it would seem this is not the case.

Peregrine Falcon

Falco peregrinus

A single bird on the 29th was seen well whilst travelling from Ulaanbaatar to Dalanzadgad.

Northern Shrike

Lanius borealis

Single birds on the 30th and the 5th whilst in the Beautiful Mountains. Maybe a little further south than expected for the time of year.

Eurasian Magpie

Pica pica

Recorded near the Tuul river on the 6th and in Hustai NP on the 7th.

Mongolian Ground-jay

Podoces hendersoni

Three birds were a nice surprise whilst birding the "Flaming Cliffs" on the 2nd.

Red-billed Chough

Pyrrhocorax pyrrhocorax

Recorded by the Tuul river on the 6th and in Hustai NP on the 7th with counts of 20+ birds.

Asian Azure-winged Magpie

Cyanopica cyanus

A minimum of 5 birds along the Tuul river on the afternoon of the 6th.

Western Jackdaw

Corvus monedula

Recorded on the 29th travelling to Dalanzadgad and near the Mongolica hotel on the 5th.

Daurian Jackdaw

Corvus dauuricus

Small numbers seen with Western Jackdaws by the Tuul river on the 5th.

Northern Raven

Corvus corax

A common species recorded daily.

Bohemian Waxwing

Bombycilla garrulus

One bird in the Baraduuz Plantation on the 5th and 30+ birds by the Tuul river on the 6th.

Azure Tit

Cyanistes cyanus

Great views of at least 5 birds by the Tuul river on the afternoon of the 6th.

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Great Tit Parus major

Counts of 1 - 2 birds along the Tuul river on the 6th.

"Steppe" Horned Lark

Eremophila alpestris

Recorded daily with some very large flocks of hundreds of birds whilst travelling through the Steppe. The subspecies is *brandti and* sometimes referred to as Steppe Horned Lark.

Mongolian Lark

Melanocorypha mongolica

Great views of this unmistakable and very attractive species with numerous flocks seen whilst travelling to and from Dalanzadgad on the 29th and the return on the 6th.

Asian Short-toed Lark

Alaudala cheleensis

A surprise winter flock of 50+ birds was seen on the 2nd whilst birding the "Flaming Cliffs."

Black-throated Thrush

Turdus atrogularis

A total of 4 birds were seen well beside the Tuul river on the 6th.

Red-throated Thrush

Turdus ruficollis

Single birds in the Beautiful Mountains on the 2nd and 3rd were followed by much closer views by the Tuul river where at least 2 birds showed very well.

Rock Sparrow

Petronia petronia

A minimum of 10 birds at a random stop while travelling to Dalanzadgad on the 29th and smaller numbers whilst in Hustai NP on the 7th.

White-winged Snowfinch

Montifringilla nivalis

Seen very well in the Beautiful Mountains on three days with small flocks of 20 - 40 birds.

Eurasian Tree Sparrow

Passer montanus

Recorded on at least five days with flocks of up to 200 birds around our camp in the Beautiful Mountains.

House Sparrow

Passer domesticus

Seen on our first day and again on the 6th near our hotel near Ulaanbaatar.

Brown Accentor

Prunella fulvescens

Some excellent views whilst in the Beautiful Mountains with a high count of 15+ birds on the 30th and even seen in the same scope when watching Snow Leopard!

Common Chaffinch

Fringilla coelebs

Counts of around 10 birds by the Tuul river on the 6th were notable winter records.

Brambling

Fringilla montifringilla

A total of 5 birds seen by the Tuul river on the 6th were notable winter records...

Siberian Long-tailed Rosefinch

Carpodacus sibiricus

Great views of at least 8 birds in and around the Tuul river on the 6th.

Common Redpoll


Acanthis flammea

A single bird at the Baraduuz Plantation on the 5th.

Snow Bunting

Plectrophenax nivalis

Two birds at a random stop in the Steppe while travelling to Dalanzadgad on the 29th was a notable record.
