HIGHLIGHTS OF TRIP

Eastern Gorilla: We enjoyed a wonderful hour in the presence of the Bitukura family group in Ruhija.

East African Potto: Three separate animals recorded with excellent views at Bigodi Swamp and in Kibale Forest.

Serval: A fantastic sighting at close range after a long night of spotlighting. **Lord Derby's Flying Squirrel:** A great sighting in Ruhija by spotlight.

White-bellied Pangolin: A privilege to see two different animals prior to their release back into the wild.

Primates: Aside from Chimps and Gorillas, we saw numerous other species including Ashy Red Colobus, Ugandan Crested Mangabey, Blue Monkey & more!

Four species of Galago: Demidoff's and Thomas's Dwarf Galago, plus Spectacled Lesser Galago and Thick-tailed Greater Galago.

Shoebill: We enjoyed fabulous views of the incredible Shoebill at Mabamba Swamp.

Summary

Following our pioneering tour in March 2022, this was Wise Birding's second attempt on trying to see African Golden Cat as well as a great selection of other mammals. Despite having sent a private client the week before on this very same itinerary who was successful in seeing the cat, sadly we were unsuccessful, despite coming close.

Of course everyone on the trip was prepared for this outcome and despite trying very hard at all hours of the day and night, we just didn't get that bit of luck that you sometimes need in mammal watching! However, what we did see were a great selection of East African mammals, including many iconic species with restricted ranges, plus a good mix of birds including a number of Albertine Rift Endemics.

We focused our effort in the Kibale Forest and the Ruhija section of Bwindi Forest. Following our pioneering tour in 2022, we have learned a great deal about African Golden Cat and how best to approach the task to actually see one in the wild. We continue to collect data on sightings (through our trail cameras) with essential help from our friends at Harrier Tours. This data set of cat movements, locations and times we hope will be invaluable for the success of our future Golden Cat tours.

African Golden Cat has been seen in the wild by few people, despite having a sizeable distribution throughout areas of Central-East and West Africa. This beautiful and mythical cat is considered to be most closely related to the Caracal and Serval and not closely related to the Asiatic Golden Cats.

We saw a total of 47 mammals and 253 species of bird on this tour.



SUMMARY OF DAILY ACTIVITIES

Much of our time was spent slowly driving quiet roads during the late afternoon and early evening for mammals and using trail cameras to assist us. In addition, we also spent much time spotlighting and using thermal imaging cameras with no lights to increase chances for mammal encounters. Despite focusing most of our time for African Golden Cat, the whole purpose of the tour was to also enjoy the other numerous mammals and birds that Uganda has to offer.






























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































Conservation Donation – Following this tour to Uganda, £200 was transferred to the Wise Birding Holiday's central conservation fund.

The IOC World Bird List complements three other primary world bird lists that differ slightly in their primary goals and taxonomic philosophy, i.e. The Clements Checklist of the Birds of the World, The Howard & Moore Complete Checklist of the Birds of the World, 4th Edition, and HBW Alive/Bird Life International.

Total number of mammals recorded: 47 species

L'hoest's Monkey

This beautiful primate was recorded on two days in the forests of Ruhija with counts of at 5 animals on the 31st and 2 animals the next day.

Red-tailed Monkey

This unmistakable primate was in Kibale Forest on four days. The **subspecies** is *Schmidti*.

Blue Monkey

A single in Kibale Forest near our lodge was a notable sighting. Animals were also heard in Kibale on the 27th. Three animals in Queen Elizabeth NP on the 30th along the Ishasha Road - **subspecies** *stuhmanni*. In Ruhija one animal was seen on the 31st with others heard nearby - **subspecies** *doggetti*. If treated as separate species they become **Stuhmann's Blue Monkey & Doggett's Silver Monkey**

Vervet Monkey

Recorded on four days in QENP and Lake Mburo NP.

Tantalus Monkey

At least 2 animals showed features for this species on the Ishasha Road - Grey/ White tail tip (not black) & greyer hands/feet. The subspecies here is thought to be *budgetti*. In time, the species may become a full species, **Budgetti's Tantalus**.

Mantled Guereza

This highly impressive primate was recorded on six days whilst exploring Entebbe Botanical Gardens and the Kibale and Ruhija forests. Seen well on numerous occasions with counts of 5-15 animals.

Ugandan Crested Mangabey

Now split from Grey-cheeked Mangabey, this species was recorded on four days, in Kibale Forest and Bigodi Swamp, with counts of up to 8+ animals.

Olive Baboon

A common species recorded on six days.

Ashy Red Colobus

A number of animals seen well whilst exploring Kibale Forest with sightings on four days.

Eastern Gorilla

Undoubtedly one of the highlights of the entire tour was spending an hour in the presence of the Bitukura family group in Ruhija on the morning of 31st March. A total of 7 animals were seen and included some great behaviour as young infants interacted with the group.

Chimpanzee

Another highlight of the tour was spending an hour with a troop of 15+ animals in Kibale Forest on the morning of the 25th March. We also had sightings of animals by chance. Crossing the Ngogo Road on the morning of the 24th (2 animals) and another 2 animals feeding in Guava trees near Guereza Canopy Lodge on the morning of the 26th.
